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			School will keep a record of pupils and staff in each group (bubble) and any close contact that takes places between children and staff in different groups. School will not share the names or details of people with coronavirus (COVID-19) unless essential to protect others;
			<ul> <li>Household members of those contacts who are sent home do not need to self-isolate themselves unless the pupil or staff member who is self- isolating subsequently develops symptoms;</li> </ul>
			If someone in a class or group that has been asked to self-isolate develops symptoms themselves within their 10-day isolation period they are instructed to follow the <u>'stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection'</u> and instructed to get a test;
			If the test is negative they are instructed to remain in isolation for the remainder of the 10-day isolation period as they could still develop the coronavirus (COVID-19) within the remaining days;
